





#### CBIC Certification: a-IPC™



- Entry-level certification examination is a measure of basic infection prevention knowledge.
- Intended for those interested in gaining expertise or pursuing careers in infection prevention and control.
- Successful certificants have a credential that demonstrates their level of interest and dedication to the field.
- Can help with a transition to acute or long-term care.
- Demonstrates proficiency in what you do.
- Stands out to hiring managers!

#### CBIC Certification: CIC®

#### The Value of the CIC®

- Instills professionalism among practitioners in infection prevention and control; and
- Formally recognizing experienced professionals in infection prevention and control who fulfill the requirements for CIC® certification and recertification.

#### **Impact of Certification**

- CIC IPs may have a stronger understanding than other practitioners of the evidence for certain IPAC practices.
- CIC IPs are more likely to recommend implementing them in the hospitals where they work-and especially when the lead IP is certified.
- Hospitals hiring certified infection preventionists were more likely to implement certain infection prevention practices.

#### CBIC Certification: CIC®

#### Survey of Surveillance

- Survey of surveillance in Middle Eastern and North African countries
- Survey of 269 IPC staff using electronic Infection Control Network database in Arab countries
- 69% had surveillance activities
- Conducting surveillance and using appropriate methods were significantly associated with CBIC certification









# CIC® Eligibility Guidelines

- 1. Completed post-secondary education in a health-related field including but not limited to medicine, nursing, laboratory technology, or public health. Post-secondary includes public or private universities, colleges, community colleges, etc.
- 2. Direct responsibility for the infection prevention program activities in a healthcare setting





# CIC® Eligibility Guidelines

- 3. Work experience, defined as active engagement in infection prevention, determined by a current job description, for compensation, for a minimum of:
  - At least one-year full-time employment OR
  - Two (2) years part-time employment OR
  - Completed 3,000 hours of infection prevention work experience earned during the previous three (3) years

# LTC-CIP® Eligibility Guidelines

- 1. Responsibility for the infection prevention and control programs/activities in a long-term care setting.
- 2. Completed post-secondary education in a health-related field including but not limited to medicine, nursing, laboratory technology, public health, or biology. Post-secondary includes public or private universities, colleges, community colleges etc.



# Recertification









#### CBIC Recertification Overview

CBIC certifications are valid for five years from the year of successful examination

Recertification takes place every five years

Recertification can be completed via infection prevention units (IPUs) or examination.



## CIC® Recertification Updates

Effective January 1, 2026, the open-book unproctored recertification examination will no longer be offered.

Recertification will be obtainable through infection prevention units (IPUs) or by retaking the initial CIC® proctored examination.



# Recertification by IPUs



#### What is an IPU?

- IPU = Infection Prevention Unit (IPU) = continuing education credits
- Can be achieved by\*:
- Presenting at conferences,
- Authoring publications
- Attending local or national conferences,
- Participating in a professional organization in a position of leadership
- And more! IPU guide available online.



<sup>\*</sup>must be infection prevention related

## Recertification by IPUs

- Candidates must submit an IPU portfolio demonstrating completion of a minimum of 40 IPUs
- a-IPCs with expiration dates through 2029 currently have a prorated number of hours <u>check</u> the website for details
- IPUs must be provided by a credible organization and at least 20/40 infection prevention units must be sponsored through an accredited organization or state licensing board.
- Candidates can accumulate IPUs any time after their previous recertification submission date throughout their five-year recertification period
- Candidates may access IPU portfolio once certified and must submit by October 31st of their expiration year.



## New! Recertification by IPUs

- Certificants who showcase leadership skills via participation in a formal mentorship program
  through a professional organization related to infection prevention and control may now earn 3
  IPUs per year of program participation.
- To promote continuous learning, effective 2028, candidates must demonstrate that a portion of their IPUs have been attained in different years of the 5-year recertification cycle.
- Effective 2028, for multi-session Infection Control Courses that offer continuous education units, an IPU may be awarded for each educational session of 1 hour or more, to a maximum of 30 IPUs for the course.
- The CBIC Board recommends candidates earn at least two IPUs from DEI and Health Equity
  within healthcare as a part of the minimum required 40 IPUs. DEI and Health Equity should be
  self-evident in the title or learning objectives.



## Recertification by IPUs: Helpful Hints

- Submit your IPUs as you earn them!
- Avoid late fees! Don't wait until October 31st to submit your portfolio
- Reach out to staff with questions
- Once your credits have been approved, you will receive a new 5-year certification and can begin submitting IPUs for your next portfolio, due in five years.






Certified as a CIC® and LTC-CIP®?
Credits can be used in both portfolios if the IPUs are earned within your 5-year certification cycle.

# IPUs and Chapter Activities Does my Chapter activity count towards IPUs?

- Subject matter related to infection prevention and control, and falls within at least one of the eight domains
- Able to verify chapter member attendance or participation by providing required documentation

- Attendance at national conferences (APIC/IPAC Canada)
- Online, print or live format education
- Webinars
- Online educational modules
- Participation in a professional organization
- Elected position on an APIC Chapter Board (Treasurer, Secretary, President, President-Elect)



### CBIC Certification: AL-CIP



- The Advanced Leadership Certification in Infection Prevention & Control (AL-CIP) is an assessment of knowledge, skills and abilities expected of individuals who demonstrate professional expertise, leadership and impact in the field of infection prevention and control.
- Portfolio-based assessment.
- Demonstrates leadership within infection prevention and control that has a measurable impact.
- Application dates: January 21, 2025-February 28, 2025 (now closed) & July 10, 2025-August 15, 2025






# AL-CIP Eligibility Requirements

- 1. Demonstrated positive impact on the profession: Active engagement and advanced infection prevention and control practice, leadership, education, research, policy and/or advocacy for a minimum of 5-10 years.
- 2. Active CIC® or LTC-CIP® certification



### **AL-CIP Framework**



### Examples of evidence\*:

- Publications (e.g., peer and non-peer-reviewed journal article, guidelines, compendium). For
  this type of evidence, include a description of your role in the publication and/or your role in the
  activities described in the publication in your rationale.
- Presentations (e.g., chapter, regional, national, or international conferences; in-person, virtual, classroom, workshop; poster presentation). For this type of evidence, describe your role in the presentation (development, implementation, delivery, etc.) in your rationale.
- Work product (e.g., toolkits, guidance documents, strategic plan, website, practice changes). For this type of evidence, clearly describe your contribution to the work product (e.g., independent, as part of a team, activities, outcomes as a result of the product) in your rationale.

\*all supporting evidence provided must be within the last ten years



### Examples of evidence\*:

- Program development materials (e.g., academic syllabus, website, course materials, program evaluation). For this type of evidence, describe your role in the program (e.g., original proposer, development, teaching, co-teaching, etc.) in your rationale.
- Credential / certifications relevant to leadership in IPC (e.g., Six sigma black belt, CPHQ, CPH, CEU/CPD). For this type of evidence, describe programs or outcomes that resulted from you having achieved this credential or certification, in your rationale.

\*all supporting evidence provided must be within the last ten years
